






Vision for the future

me as your new Council Leader.

It was an honour to be appointed in May this year. To all Rushmoor residents, I promise that we will work hard to deliver a borough that you can feel proud of.

We already have a lot to be proud of in our area, but I know there are several areas where our towns fall short of your expectations. I'm pleased to have this opportunity to introduce your new council leadership and explain what we are doing to deliver on our promises to residents.

On pages 8 and 9 of this issue we set out our key priorities; making sure our thriving local economy is reflected in our town centres and in local job opportunities; decent local housing for local people; making sure our towns and neighbourhoods are clean and safe; and that you have the opportunities you need to lead healthy and active lives.

I'm pleased to say we have already made progress on these, including addressing antisocial behaviour in our town centres, and plans to address fly-tipping.

When we came into office in May, we were clear about the council's financial challenges. We are determined to protect essential services for residents but we will also make the tough choices on spending and charges to balance the budget for the longterm, to ensure the council remains financially stable.

The first of these is to be clear that the proposed leisure and cultural hub is not viable in its current form and will need to be revised significantly.

We are therefore working on plans to deliver the leisure centre Farnborough needs using the remaining funds from the £20 million Levelling Up government grant (page 7). With Union Yard about to open in Aldershot, we will also bring forward new proposals to reinvigorate Farnborough town centre that are affordable and contribute significantly to the revitalisation of our borough.

As we enter 2025, we are committed to engaging and involving residents and businesses in our plans and we want to create more opportunities for you to get involved (page 9). For the time being though, I wish you a very good Christmas and the best of health and happiness for the new year.




New calendar compares Aldershot's past and present

With most of us having more time at home, Christmas can be a good time to have a sort out and think about the things that can be recycled or given a new home.

Whether it's wrapping paper tubes, biscuit tins or flattened delivery boxes, there's plenty that can go into your blue recycling bin.

When you're raising a glass with family and friends, don't forget that we want all your glass bottles too (in your basket, box, or purple bin).

Donating pre-loved items to charity shops or using our neighbourhood recycling facilities can help to give second-hand items a new life, but please dispose of things responsibly. You can recycle festive food waste in your black caddy, but remember that leftovers can also be frozen or transformed into another meal. There are lots of ideas on the Love Food Hate Waste website, **www.lovefoodhatewaste.com/recipes** to inspire you.

Recently our crews have been noticing more food waste finding its way into the green rubbish bins, so please remember to recycle all you can this Christmas. You can recycle all types of food waste with your weekly collection, including food scraps, peelings, teabags, coffee grounds, and more – we accept it all.

caddy, go to **www.rushmoor.gov.uk/ foodwaste**. You'll also find tips there on how to keep pests away. One of the most important things is to keep your caddy in the locked position (with the handle down to the front).

And once you've packed away all the tinsel and baubles for another year, don't forget that you can also recycle your real Christmas tree. Our service is free of charge, although you do need to book your collection in advance.

Shining a light on worthy causes!

You can support worthy causes across Rushmoor, by buying a weekly **Rushmoor Community** Lottery ticket for just £1.

The lottery has been helping community groups, sports clubs, good causes and charities to raise funds since 2017.

When you buy a weekly ticket, half of the money goes straight to a cause chosen by you, and 10p goes to the Rushmoor Community Fund.

For you, there is a chance to win prizes of up to £25,000!

All those 10ps in the community fund add up and good causes are invited to apply for grants of up to £1,000 for local projects.



In the autumn, we were delighted to award more than £14,000 in grants shared between 17 local projects and presented at a special event hosted by Farnborough Bowling Club.

Among the lucky recipients, the Friends of Guillemont School received £1,000

towards the cost of an adventure pirate ship for children at the school.

The group, made up of parents and teachers, has been working tirelessly to raise funds for the adventure play equipment which is costing around £20,000. The finished ship has clamber nets, ladders, tunnels and portholes as well as a mast, sails and a telescope - so that young pirate adventurers can keep an eye on the horizon!

"We were thrilled to receive this funding from the Rushmoor Community Lottery, which has helped us to reach our fundraising goal.

"The pirate ship is going to bring so much joy to the children and will be enjoyed for many years to come," says Sam Miller from the Friends of Guillemont School.

Going for gold!

With a silver award in the Defence Employer **Recognition Scheme (ERS) once** more secured, we are now 'going for gold' in supporting our armed forces community!



The council was recently re-accredited the silver award and has previously signed the Armed Forces Covenant as a pledge of support to our armed forces community.

This means that we are proud to be supportive of serving personnel and service families living locally, and to be a forces-friendly employer, with flexible working arrangements to support those with a connection to the armed forces.

Now we are aiming for gold in the employer recognition scheme.

Our new reservists policy makes sure that a reservist, who combines their civilian career at Rushmoor with their military duties in their spare time, will be treated fairly. The council has

flexible working arrangements for any staff who are, or will become, reservists in the armed forces, and to support those with a link to military life, including armed forces' families and cadet forces.

We also have an armed forces champion, Councillor Nadia Martin, who is backing our involvement in the scheme and our activities to support and build connections with our armed forces' families and veterans.

Union Yard latest

We were delighted to welcome 128 students to our new student accommodation in Union Yard. Aldershot at the start of the new college year.

The students are settling in well and bringing new footfall into the town centre, which is great to see.

As Arena went to print, the final work was nearing competition on the development, with landscaping work taking shape in the inner courtyard. The walkway from Union Yard to the High Street will be open in the new year.

We are looking forward to the first homes being occupied in the new year and are close to finalising the first legal agreements on the commercial leases, with several others in progress and further interest in our makers' yard units. Over the coming weeks, you'll start to see fit-out work under way, ready to welcome customers in February.

New plans for Farnborough leisure centre

We are drawing up new plans for a leisure centre and swimming pool in Farnborough that will be affordable to the council.

As you will have read in the Leader's column and below, the council is facing significant financial challenges.

Additionally, the costs of our earlier scheme for a wider leisure and cultural hub have increased significantly. This has confirmed our view that the scheme is not affordable to us.

Over the last couple of months, we've been looking at other leisure centre

schemes. We're also talking to the government about still being able to use the Levelling Up funding we received for the hub towards the cost of the new centre.

The government has invited us to share our plans and will need to agree them before we press ahead with more

detailed designs.

On the road to financial stability

Our Cabinet has approved a detailed financial recovery plan following an independent review of the council's budgets earlier this year.

The plan outlines steps that we need to take to secure our future financial stability after an independent assessment confirmed we needed to take immediate action and to reduce our level of borrowing.

In addition, our Medium Term Financial Strategy (MTFS), had identified in February that at this time, the budget was set using £5 million of financial reserves and that we would be facing a budget shortfall of more than £19

million over the next four years - more than the total available reserves.

The plan focuses on three main areas of action: to review spending and reduce budgets, saving more than £600,000 this financial year and at least £2 million annually by 2027/28; to reduce debt by selling £40 million of council assets over the next three years, including £5 million this year; and to strengthen the council's financial capability and capacity.

Our annual budget comes to more than £40 million, which includes debt interest of £8 million a year, so selling assets will help reduce this cost to protect essential local services.

Did you know that council tax makes up just 18% of the council's income, with the rest coming from business rates, commercial investments and fees and charges for our services.

And although we collect council tax, we keep just 11p in every pound, with most of it going to Hampshire County Council, and a share to the police and fire services.

New priorities delivering change

Over the last six months the Cabinet has drawn up a new set of priorities for Aldershot and Farnborough based on your feedback - and these priorities are already beginning to deliver change.

Since being elected in May as part of a change of political administration, the Cabinet has set to work on developing five main priority themes, also making sure we continue to provide our core local services.

These themes will form part of a new council delivery plan, setting out our activities for 2025/26. We also want to engage more widely with you so we can develop a shared vision for the council and our area and a new council plan to deliver that vision.

Skills, economy and business

Making sure our towns meet the needs of businesses and our residents is really important to us. This means working with experts and with our partners to help transform and make the most of them.

We are working with businesses to boost local jobs, including encouraging new companies to set up in Rushmoor, highlighting the many benefits our area has to offer.

We also want to develop more training opportunities for residents, so you have the skills needed to benefit from a strong local economy.



Homes for all: quality living, affordable housing

We know how important it is for local people to have access to decent housing.

As part of this, we are actively engaging more with social housing providers, as we want to see an improvement in their performance locally. We are also looking at how we can provide good quality temporary housing to those in need.

If you rent privately, we want to make sure our local homes are of a high quality and we will take action where they are not. We will also make it easier for you to understand how we allocate social housing.

In the longer term, we will progress a new Rushmoor Local Plan that maximises the delivery of new homes and takes previously developed but unused council-owned land to provide new and affordable homes.

Community and wellbeing: active lives, healthier and stronger communities

At the heart of our desire to make sure everyone has access to opportunities to exercise and keep fit is the new Farnborough leisure centre. We know it needs to be affordable, and we are working hard to bring this forward as soon as we can (see page 7).

We will continue to increase our popular programme of community and cultural events for all, as we want Rushmoor to be a place where everyone feels at home.

We are also working with our partners to address health issues and improve access to mental health support.





Pride in place: clean, safe and vibrant neighbourhoods

We want our streets and town centres to be clean, safe and welcoming and the Cabinet has appointed a pride in place champion to encourage local people to get involved.

In our town centres, we have been working closely with the police to deal with issues of antisocial behaviour that are unacceptable to us and will continue to do so.

We are also tackling fly-tipping head-on and earlier this month, we trialled a mobile collection scheme, 'Walk this Waste', in the Cherrywood area of Farnborough. This gives residents who are unable to get to the tip the chance to get rid of their old household items. We'll be reviewing how this went before we decide whether to roll this out more widely.

Vision for the future and financial sustainability

We want to know what residents and businesses think about the area and how they'd like to see it develop in the longer term. We're expanding our opportunities for you to get involved in consultations and engagement events, so we have a shared vision for our towns.

The Cabinet is also committed to tackling climate change and we will be bringing forward a more ambitious climate change action plan.

At the same time, we need to make sure our services and activities are affordable as well as of a good quality. As well as continuing to look to improve what we do, we will be delivering against our financial recovery plan (page 7) and we will put in place clear ways to monitor what we do, so we can be accountable to you.



Get involved and make a difference

We want to expand our opportunities for you to get involved in the council and in your local area - we need you!

If you care about the future, why not join our new Rushmoor climate community group. The group meets every three months with updates on our work to tackle climate change locally and the chance for you to give your views and get involved.

We'll also ask for your first name and last name (as it appears on the bill) along with your address. Your bill can be sent to one email address, and we will send you a verification code to register your account.

By switching over, you'll be helping us to save money on printing and postage costs that we can redirect into other services, and it's kinder to the environment too.

Save money and energy costs this winter

Although Christmas is a time of celebration for many it also means more pressure on tight budgets.

The good news though, is that help is available, and there is lots you can do to save money and energy.

It's always worth checking if you can claim any benefits. You might be entitled even if you work, have savings or own your home.

If you are pension age, check if you can claim Pension Credit. If you are eligible, and do qualify, you may be able to get other money and help.



If you're struggling to pay your energy bills, always contact your energy supplier. They can issue fuel vouchers or grants. You might also be able to save money on your bills by switching to a different supplier or tariff.

Citizens Advice Rushmoor provides advice on energy, money and benefits, and can issue energy payments to help with bills worth up to £147. And don't forget the Community Grub Hub, which offers food and household items – as well as Citizens Advice help – every Tuesday, 10am to 4pm, at Windsor Way in Aldershot.
